Staff Car Park and Gates - Safeguarding Concerns

We kindly ask that all parents (especially those using Beehive) refrain from using the staff car park, as it is designated for **staff use only**. There have been a number instances where parents have used the staff car park in an unsafe manner, putting children's safety at risk. This is particularly concerning as children walk through the car park at the beginning and end of the day.

In addition, if you are dropping off or picking up children from Beehive, please support us by **closing the pedestrian gate** when you enter or leave the school to ensure the safety of all children on the school site.

Parking Safely

Can I also request that if you are driving to or from school, please ensure that you **park legally and safely**. We have received complaints from several neighbours who have had their driveways blocked by parents, who then argue when asked to move their vehicles. **Traffic wardens** have been made aware of the situation and will be patrolling the area outside the school.

Remember, you should never park on the mini-roundabout or use the school gate area for a quick drop-off. This is dangerous for both your child and others entering the premises. Thank you for your cooperation and understanding.

Safeguarding and Child Protection

Safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children is defined as:

- 1. Protecting children from maltreatment;
- 2. Preventing the impairment of children's mental and physical health or development;
- 3. Ensuring that children grow up in circumstances consistent with the provision of safe and effective care;
- 4. Taking action to enable all children to have the best outcomes.

At Wildmoor Heath School, all staff maintain a culture of vigilance and put the health and safety, learning progress and pastoral needs of our learners first. We have robust safeguarding procedures in place, including annual formal training for all staff

Wildmoor Heath have three trained DSLs who receive multi-agency training, attend ongoing formative sessions and represent the school at Child Protection meetings. Mrs Vincent is the Designated Safety Leader (DSL), supported by Mrs MacManus and Mrs Joseph as our Deputy Designated Safety Leaders (DDSLs).




PTA News
